HOW DO I START SCOOTER RACING?



Firstly join the BSSO

BSSO membership currently costs £35 a year and entitles you to enter scooter race meetings. . Note - you need to be a member of the BSSO before you apply for your ACU scooter race license.

Read the BSSO machine construction regulations

The BSSO Regulations are available as a download at this site. Familiarize yourself with the regulations. These tell you what you can and can't do to your scooter.



Decide which group you want to compete in

No matter what scooter you use we have a group to suit you, whether it is a Gilera Runner,

Rumi Bol d'Or. Our classes cater for everything from sidecars to liquid cooled, as well as specially constructed solos, and for all capacities of scooter from 50cc to 650cc

Build a bike to the spec for that group



Get an ACU racing license



This is an essential requirement, without an ACU license you cannot race. Everyone who races a two or three wheeled vehicle needs a race license from the ACU — the organisation that controls motorcycle sport in the UK. A scooter race license will cost you (prices vary depending on what type of license you


want) approx. £45 per year. Every three years you will need to supply the ACU with an optician's report on your eyesight. For competitors over 55 it is required yearly (Note - you cannot get an ACU license for scooter racing without being a member of the BSSO). New addition is that a course is held at ACU headquarters in Rugby which is compulsory before any license is issued. For all new and lapsed acu licence applications you are required to take a written test (very simple) and on the track assessment (just to make sure your safe) Please take your acu licence form with you to the course. Once you have filled in all sections relevant to you then sign it and get the code off the BSSO membership secretary to write on it as shown below



Get the right protective equipment

When you race a Scooter you will need to protect yourself in case you take a tumble. ACU regulations require you to wear a one-piece leather or Kevlar suit, a current ACU gold standard crash helmet, leather gloves, leather boots that cover the ankle and a dog tag around your neck that carries your name and date of birth. Your machine and your protective equipment is inspected every morning of each fixture to ensure that is conforms to acu rules and safety. Race day Program:

Most competitors tend to arrive sometime on the Friday before the fixture. Giving you chance to set up and have a good look around the circuit facilities and if you want to a walk around the track! Please see sections proceeding this on circuit information. You can find circuit contact info, circuit maps and paddock information and facilities at the circuit. The entry fee you pay is for 1 x practice session and 2 races each day.

We want to make your experience hassle enjoyable, so here are the on-the-day steps you need to do before going out for practice.

- 1. **Technical Inspection**: If scrutineers have arrived they will generally inspect your bikes and clothing on the Friday evening anywhere between 4pm and 7pm. If Friday isn't convenient don't worry, technical inspection starts around 7:30am till around 8:30am Saturday morning. You will need to take your technical inspection card with you. You receive this with your tickets prior to the meeting.
- 2. **Signing on**: once your bike and clothing has been passed, you need to go to the office and sign on taking your club and acu membership cards as proof. You can get your transponders from the office and also your programme so you know which races are yours.
- 3. **No bikes are started up** till advised by the circuit so please be aware of this, once engines are given the all clear to be started we will require you to go for noise testing. The scrutineers will advise you of where this takes place, just ask them!
- 4. So after completing 1-3 you're ready to go, make sure you have done your final checks of the scooter (fuel, tyre pressures, etc.) and wait for the paddock announcement for your practice session. You usually get a first second and final call so listen out for them.
- 5. **Grid positions** are not contained in the programme, these will be distributed by bsso officials prior to the meeting or on the day
- 6. Any queries at all, please see any of the **BSSO officials** or even competitors we are all here to help each other out so don't be afraid to ask! We have all been a newcomer and know what it is like. Please see **contact us page for all BSSO officials** contained in this handbook.

DRIVING TO CROFT CIRCUIT

TRAVELLING SOUTH BY ROAD

Take junction 58 off the A1(M) signed Darlington. Follow this route through Darlington, then follow the A167 towards Northallerton. Croft Circuit is signposted approximately 2 miles south of Croft on Tees.

TRAVELLING NORTH BY ROAD

Take junction 57 off the A1(M) to Darlington. At the second roundabout take the 5th exit-signed Northallerton A167. Continue on this route as above.

TRAVELLING BY RAIL

The nearest station to Croft Circuit is Darlington which is 4 miles to the North. Darlington Station is frequently serviced by the East Coast Main Line. Contact BR on 0345 225225.



Lydden has electric hook-ups but these come with a small charge (usually £5 per day)

There are catering vans in the day but no bar or facilities at night time. This is a great circuit for atmosphere for all competitors and spectators

Racing Checklist (helpful guide on what you need to remember for the day)

- Your circuit entry tickets/car pass and technical inspection card
 - Your acu and bsso membership cards
 - All your protective equipment: helmet, gloves, leathers, boots, dog tag
 - Sleeping arrangements? Tent, car, van, caravan
- Food, check with the circuit information on which circuits have café's if you don't want the hassle of cooking
 - Your Scooter (always handy to pack!)
 - Spares
 - Tools
- Fire Extinguisher: all hosting clubs may do spot checks to make sure you have this with you. It is an ACU requirement
